Summary of Results – February 8, 2022

Methodology



- Survey of voters in Sierra Sands Unified School District
- Survey data has been weighted to reflect a likely June 2022 electorate
- Mixed-mode methodology (telephone/web)
 - Phone interviews conducted by trained, professional interviewers; landlines & mobile phones included
 - Email and text invitations were sent to complete the survey online
- Conducted October 19-26, 2021
- 300 interviews; overall margin of error ±5.7 percentage points
- Where applicable, results compared with a previous mixed-mode survey (tel/web) among likely voters in the District conducted Jan. 14-20, 2020: n=314, margin of error ±5.5 % pts

Please note that due to rounding, some percentages may not add up to exactly 100%.

Key Findings




- Sierra Sands Unified School District continues to be viewed positively by local voters and perceptions of the condition of local school buildings and grounds as well as financial management have improved.
- Although two-thirds continue to see at least some need for more money for SSUSD schools, that perception has softened since January 2020.
- Support today for a bond measure for SSUSD hovers near the 55% threshold needed to pass.
- The potential bond projects tested are important to many—particularly expanding STEAM and CTE programs and keeping schools clean and well-maintained.
- There are a variety of reasons to support the measure that voters find compelling; support solidifies but does not increase after respondents hear about these reasons.
- Support for a measure drops after respondents are presented with reasons to oppose it.

Right Direction/Wrong Track: Your Area




Voters feel less optimistic about how things are going in the area compared to 2020.



District Ratings




Perceptions of how the District is doing on its core responsibilities are generally positive—particularly the job teachers are doing. Voters are more divided on financial management and the job the District is doing responding to COVID-19.



District Ratings, Over Time




Perceptions of the condition of local school buildings and grounds as well as financial management have improved.



Perceived Need for Funding, Over Time




Although two-thirds continue to see at least some need for more money for SSUSD schools, that perception has softened noticeably since January 2020.



Tax Sentiment



Over half trust the District to properly manage tax dollars and many believe that maintaining quality schools should be a priority.




Tax Sentiment, Over Time



Sensitivity to new taxes has increased slightly with three-in-five expressing resistance to tax increases.

"Taxes are already too high, I would never vote for a tax increase no matter how it might be used."






Potential Bond Measure

Potential Bond Measure: Support Today



Support today for the bond measure tested is right near the 55% threshold needed for passage.

To update and reconstruct local schools to expand science, technology, engineering, arts and math programs; provide equitable access to modernized classrooms/facilities; improve school safety and energy efficiency; construct and equip classrooms/facilities; shall Sierra Sands Unified School District issue \$52,800,000 in bonds, at legal rates, raising an annual average of \$2,800,000, at approximately \$60 per \$100,000 dollars of assessed valuation while bonds are outstanding, with independent oversight, audits, no money for administrators' salaries/pensions, and all funds remaining local?



Potential Bond Measure: Support Today




Support for the measure tested today is similar to what was tested in January 2020.

To update and reconstruct local schools to expand science, technology, engineering, arts and math programs; provide updated classrooms/labs for 21st century learning; improve school earthquake safety/disabled access; and construct and equip classrooms/facilities; shall Sierra Sands Unified School District issue \$45,700,000 in bonds, at legal rates, repaying an annual average of \$2,690,000, at approximately \$60 per \$100,000 assessed valuation while bonds are outstanding, with independent oversight, audits, no money for administrators' salaries/pensions, and all funds remaining local?


To update and reconstruct local schools to expand science, technology, engineering, arts and math programs; provide equitable access to modernized classrooms/facilities; improve school safety and energy efficiency; construct and equip classrooms/facilities; shall Sierra Sands Unified School District issue \$52,800,000 in bonds, at legal rates, raising an annual average of \$2,800,000, at approximately \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation while bonds are outstanding, with independent oversight, audits, no money for administrators' salaries/pensions, and all funds remaining local?

The projects tested are all important to more than half—particularly expanding STEAM and CTE programs, as well as keeping school clean and well-maintained.





Other information is also compelling to more than half.



Vote Progression



Support for the measure solidifies but does not increase after respondents are presented with additional information and is impacted by opposition messages.



Conclusions & Recommendations



- Opinions of the District continue to be mostly positive. With shifts in perception of the school grounds and financial management, it seems some are aware of recent school improvements.
- Although many continue to see a need for additional money for local schools and value quality schools in the community, there is also some tax aversion.
- A bond measure for SSUSD appears feasible yet challenging for the June 2022 ballot.
- The success of a measure could depend on voters' awareness of the fiscal accountability provisions of a measure, the benefits to STEAM and CTE programs, and the value to the community of having high-quality local schools.
